Participation

How do we get members to participate? Sometimes we forget that everyone in the Lodge may not have the same passion or the involvement level. For those that are more involved, it is sometimes hard to understand why all the members don't have the same commitment level that we do. The more involved members think the "rest" of the Lodge are slackers, lazy, and uncommitted. The lesser involved members think the "super involved" are crazy, bullies, and intimidating. Where is the happy medium?

To often we lose members who might have been good active members, because we push too hard or expect too much of them too soon. I know we get excited when we get a new member. We automatically think wow a new body to help! A new person to take some of the pressure off, someone to carry part of the load. What we sometimes forget is that everyone must make their own level of commitment. One cannot force someone else to do anything. My Brothers and Sisters, we are volunteers. As soon as members are expected to do more than they are able to commit to they will begin to pull back. If this continues the member will most often stop coming to Lodge thus becoming one more lost member.

Almost every Lodge has had a loss similar to what I have just described. How do we deal with this issue? The first thing we need to do is to invite members to participate in our activities but not push them. Let it be their choice to participate or not. We can ask our members to become more involved in the selection of the activities the Lodge participates in. Find out what interests our members have and try to focus our activities around those interests. Try to match the interests of our members to Lodge projects. The more the member feels a part of the project the more comfortable they will feel volunteering to help.



Oliver Creswick December 10, 1918 - February 12, 2015 Past Grand Master 1976-1977

Oliver Creswick was born in Providence, Rhode Island on December 10, 1918, the youngest of nine children, and a twin at that. He grew up in Rhode Island and was educated in the public schools of Warwick, RI.



He served in the Army Air Force 1941-1945. While in the Air Force, and stationed in Spokane, WA, he met and married Hester Seuell. They had three sons, one daughter and many grand, great grand and great-great grand children.

Oliver graduated from the New England Institute of Anatomy, Sanitary Science and Embalming in 1946, Boston Massachusetts. Oliver and Hester then moved to Oregon in December of 1946, and worked in Baker for three years, where he served his apprenticeship and received his embalmers license.

In April of 1949 they purchased the funeral home in Heppner and operated it for sixteen years. They moved to Portland in 1964 and purchased the Cascade Funeral Chapel in 1965, and in 1972 they purchased the Jacobson-Hart Funeral Home and merged the two operations into the Jacobson-Cascade Funeral Home.

While residing in Heppner, Oliver and Hester were active in many fraternal, church and civic endeavors. In addition to the funeral home, Oliver was employed by the US Forest Service as their District Clerk for seven years, and also served as Morrow County Assessor for two years. In 1963 he was appointed by Governor Hatfield to serve as Justice of the Peace for the 6th District of Morrow County.

Oliver was initiated into Willow Lodge No. 66 in 1953 and upon moving to Portland he transferred to Mt Scott Lodge No. 188 and served as Noble Grand multiple times. He was Master of Heppner Lodge No. 69 A.F. & A.M. Worthy Patron of Ruth Chapter No. 32, O.E.S. and Worthy Patron of Mt Scott Chapter No. 110, O.E.S. in Portland. He served as Excellent High Priest of Heppner Chapter No. 26 R.A.M. and President of the Mt Scott Kiwanis Club. He served as President of the Oregon Funeral Directors Association in 1971-1972 and served on their Board of Directors for thirteen years. He was a member of Al Kader Shrine Temple.

During his term as Grand Master, Oliver and Hester traveled around our jurisdiction in their Minnie Winnie Winnebago motor home.

He worked for years in planning the construction of the Odd Fellows Retirement facility. When he retired he and Hester were some of the first people to move in. Hester passed away November 10, 1999.

Oliver did some traveling to England and Ireland, later marrying Mary Bogart Colton in 2000. Mary passed in 2010.



Suggestions for a Larger Field

Since Odd Fellowship is now so large a body that there is no occasion to fear its decline, nor to work for membership in general, but merely to seek such as will both easily be helped by its divine teachings, and be able to work with others, to give help to man, in all worthy endeavors, there is a trend of thought among our more thoughtful members that it should try to make its members better citizens in all relations of life. We approach this subject with extreme diffidence, because it is a serious task to change or improve an Order as numerous as some of our large religious bodies, and quite as successful in its field.
