

Chemekta Lodge No. 1 First Chartered Lodge in Oregon



Chemeketa Lodge No. 1 was first lodge to be chartered in the Oregon Territory, which at that time included all of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and parts of Wyoming and Montana.

Chemeketa was founded in 1852 under the leadership and initiative of General Eli Mosley Barnum. He was the first Grand Master of the Oregon Territory, and the namesake Barnum Lodge No. 7. He was also one of the first trustees of Willamette University. In 1853 he was commissioned to supervise construction of the Oregon Territory Capitol Building, and in 1854 he was appointed Adjutant General of the Territorial Militia.

At the end of the first year of Odd Fellowship in Oregon, Chemeketa lodge had 33 members. From there the Order took off like a rocket. Lodges were instituted around the state, and two more opened in Salem - Anniversary Lodge No. 13, instituted in 1866, and Olive Lodge No. 18 in 1868.

Burying the dead was the major focus of Chemeketa Lodge and an obligation they fulfilled without prejudice. Records show that Chemeketa's Odd Fellows Rural Cemetery provided burials for African-Americans, Chinese, Japanese, orphans, inmates, and the homeless.

Salem's Odd Fellows earned the respect and admiration of their community. When Chemeketa laid the cornerstone for their building on June 13, 1900, it was such a big deal, even the schools were closed to allow the students to attend.

In 1919 Salem was chosen to host the Grand Lodge Session. Over 3,200 Odd Fellows and Rebekahs attended.

a general assembly of the Order was held in the State House of Representatives. A banquet followed with "a program of fun and mirth under the direction of the Muscovites."

When Chemeketa celebrated its centennial in 1952, the Capital Journal ran a "Special I.O.O.F." edition dedicated to Salem's Odd Fellows.

Now in its 167th year, Chemeketa No. 1, the first Odd Fellows lodge in the Pacific Northwest, is still active and thriving. With over 130 members, it's a great example for all Oregon lodges, with a history we all can be proud of!



Chemekta Lodge No. 1 Celebrated It's 166th Anniversary



On January 10, 2019 Chemeketa Lodge No. 1 celebrated it's 166th anniversary with a nice dinner and fundraiser. We had 50 people (members plus family) there. We had pulled pork sandwiches from our in-house BBQ place, "Roger That BBQ", plus potluck sides and desserts. As typical for Odd Fellows, we had a lot of food! It was a nice evening and we also asked for donations to Taylor's House. Two years ago, a homeless teen named Taylor died on the streets of Salem in the winter. Taylor's House opened just a month ago and has 12 homeless teens living there. The goal is to reunite them with some family through counseling. Our lodge collected \$415 to donate to the house.
