Morand Scholarship Forms Available

Once again we are receiving high praise from several of our scholarship recipients in their thank you notes. The thanks are not just for the Morand Committee but to all Odd Fellows and Rebekahs and the work you are doing to support the programs of the Grand Lodge of Oregon.

It is time to make the call, tell the student to contact the Grand Lodge office and request your application for a Morand Scholarship. Request one of the Morand brochures at the same time for additional information about the Morand Scholarship program. The Grand Lodge office is the only source for the most recent forms, you must get an application with the date 10/12/16 in the lower left hand corner of the page.

The Morand Committee met and have updated the scholarship application forms. College students who will complete at least one term of college by January 31, 2017 and have attained a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher are eligible to apply for a scholarship. The committee awards scholarships in February of each year, and all Odd Fellows, Rebekahs and their family members are encouraged to apply. Our Brochure outlines all the criteria and directions for applying for a scholarship. Request a few of the Morand Brochures from the Grand Lodge Office. All Odd Fellow and Rebekah lodges should have a few of them for members with college age family members.

The deadline for applying for a scholarship is fast approaching. All applications must be in the Grand Lodge office no later than January 31, 2017. Remember, these scholarships are for members, or their family members and are only for Oregon students attending an Oregon school unless their field of study is not offered in Oregon.

Don't delay, request your scholarship application today from the Grand Lodge Office, then complete all the requirements in the application form to apply for your scholarship.


We had a good showing of our members who attended the Committee Planning meeting where lots of work was done on By-laws, other planning and setting up on-going meeting dates.

United Nations Educational Pilgrimage for Youth

The Odd Fellows and Rebekahs United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth is an educational tour of approximately two weeks duration for 16 and 17-year-old young people who have at least one year left in high school.

This unique "Educational Program" was established by The Sovereign Grand Lodge Independent Order of Odd Fellows in 1949 when the United Nations was just a four-year-old "toddler." Annually the UN Pilgrimage brings together high school students from around the world to study and learn about the United Nations. For young adults interested in world affairs, international relations, economics and/or political sciences this is an opportunity of a lifetime to observe the United Nations in person while exchanging views on education, politics and religion. Students tour the United Nations building and listen to behind-the-scenes briefings conducted by specialized United Nations agencies and departments including Ambassadors, Ministers, Counselors, and Country Representatives. Each student (delegate) will participate in in-depth discussions with other young people from around the world as well as make new and lifelong friends. In addition, students experience one of the greatest cities in the world, New York, attending a Broadway play, St. Patrick's Cathedral, Rockefeller Center and much more.

In the years since it was established, over 43,000 students have participated in the UN Pilgrimage. Growing in popularity, the Odd Fellows and Rebekahs United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth program has been garnering growing public attention in the United States, Canada and abroad. The National Association of Secondary School Principals has placed this program on the Advisory List of National Contests and Activities.

In 1999, The Sovereign Grand Lodge established the IOOF United Nations Educational Pilgrimage for Youth, Inc., a tax exempt 501(c)3 corporation to administer the Odd Fellows and Rebekah's United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth. All Tour fees are paid directly to the U. N. Pilgrimage, however all donations in the United States may be made to the UNEP, Inc. and are deductible in accordance with the U. S. Tax code.

Oregon is proud to participate in this program, along with 50 other state jurisdictions and 30 international jurisdictions. We also recognize the massive subsidies that Sovereign makes to this program, making it possible for Oregon students to participate.

Does Going Dark Gast a Long Shadow?

Going "Dark" in the summer months has had many good arguments. After all, it is the time to take the traditional summer vacation and these vacations will cause membership participation to drop in the summer. You may not want to conduct business without the full complement of regular members. You may want to give your desk officers a break. The list goes on. However, over the last few decades, I have seen a very awful trend.

Other events happen throughout the year. There are big family and travel holidays such as Thanksgiving and Christmas that could give reason to go dark in November and December. Then there is bad weather in January and February, which would be good candidates for going dark. Spring is the time for wedding anniversaries, so there goes March and April. There is always lots of activity when school starts up, so there goes September. That would leave time for lodge meetings in May and October only.

The point of the previous ridiculous paragraph is to show that if you do not want to meet, then you can always find a reason. On the other hand, it is also human nature to like consistency and predictability, which is why meeting every month will give your lodge warm fuzzies. For my home lodge, it is comforting to know we meet every first and third Wednesday at a set time. With twenty-four meetings per year, it is not inconvenient for the lodge if I miss two or three meetings a year.

The advantage of knowing that I meet every month on a set day is that it is easy to schedule. I also know and my sisters and brothers will understand that I may miss a meeting or two due to family obligations. There are very good reasons why a member cannot attend a meeting during the year and we, as a lodge, understand these absences.

In the past, I belonged to lodges that went dark in May & June, others in July & August, and still others in June through August. Every year, in at least one lodge, there would be a member that got use to these "extra" summer days. As a result, they did not return to the regular lodge meetings. Then there were the members that could not remember which lodge started up when and they started to miss meetings.

The awful trend that I mentioned is that membership participation inched down each year without notice,

until achieving a quorum became a problem. Most of the lodges, that I belong to, has realized this trend and have decided to meet every month during the year, while understanding that not all members will attend every meeting. Another advantage in meeting every month is when a member has not attended for a few meetings they do not have to question if the lodge meets this month.

It may seem odd to be writing about summer breaks at this time of the year. If your lodge goes dark, then you have time to decide if you want to continue this practice. If your lodge decides to change, now is the time to re-write your by-laws to change your meeting dates. By bringing this issue to you now, you have time to write the proposed by-laws, read it in open lodge, and send it in for final approval.

We are fully aware that every lodge has the solemn obligation to govern their lodge to the betterment of their members, within the rules and regulations of our Order, and that the lodge members have the right to vote for what they believe is the best for all members. We do ask that you consider the advantages of having your lodge meet every month.
